## Mound Cold War Discovery Center Now Open to Public Following Ribbon Cutting

To commemorate its opening, a ribbon cutting was held at the Mound Cold War Discovery Center on Monday, April 23. Those in attendance included Ohio Congressman Mike Turner, Miamisburg Mayor Dick Church, U.S. Department of Energy Deputy Assistant Secretary for Intergovernmental and External Affairs Douglas Little, Mound Development Corporation President Eric Cluxton, and Dayton History President & CEO Brady Kress.

Formerly known as the Mound Science and Energy Museum, the new Mound Cold War Discovery Center is the product of a collaborative effort between Mound Development Corporation, the Department of Energy, the office of Congressman Mike Turner, and Dayton History, a non-profit organization dedicated to preserving the history of the greater Dayton area. For the past two years, Dayton History staff has been conducting interviews of former Mound Laboratory employees, processing artifacts, and digitizing more than 80,000 negatives to be included in the museum collection.

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Mound Laboratory had its origins in the World War II Manhattan Project, in which Dayton scientists were responsible for the final chemistry and metallurgy to isolate polonium, which was needed for the atomic bomb initiator. After successful demonstrations of their work in the skies over Japan, a site was located in Miamisburg, Ohio and construction on the Mound Laboratory began.

With origins in the World War II Manhattan Project, the Mound Laboratory was the first permanent atomic energy facility to be constructed in the United States, and its mission was to support atomic weapons research through the development of the radioactive element polonium. Having officially opened in 1949 with 17 buildings built on the original 182-acre site, the Mound Laboratory was on the cutting edge of science and technology for more than 50 years. Since being decommissioned in 2003, the Mound property has been repurposed into a business park, and now, the Mound Cold War Discovery Center.

"This property has been of great significance not just to our local community, but also the world," said Mound Business Park President Eric Cluxton. "With the support of Congressman Mike Turner and Dayton History, we are honored to be the ones helping preserve that history while also stewarding the Mound's positive impact on our local economy."

Located at 1075 Mound Road in Miamisburg, the Mound Cold War Discovery Center is now open to the public Wednesday-Saturday, 10 AM-4 PM. Admission is free, including tours, educational programs, workshops, school visits, lectures, and more.

## Miamisburg Bicentennial: Helping to Celebrate 200 Years

One property that predates Miamisburg's 200-year history: The Miamisburg Mound! Once serving as an ancient burial site, the Miamisburg Mound stands as perhaps the most recognizable historic landmark in Miamisburg. It is one of the two largest conical mounds in eastern North America. Listed on the National Register of Historic Places, the Miamisburg Mound is 65 feet tall and 800 feet in circumference and contains 54,000 cubic yards of earth.

We are proud of our history and were also proud to help facilitate part of Miamisburg's Bicentennial Celebration.

This year, Mound Business Park served as the starting point for the Bicentennial Parade. We were also happy to host parking and shuttles for the event. Cheers to Miamisburg on 200 years!


